# THE CITY OF HERZLIYA

IDC is located in Herzliya, a city six miles north of Tel Aviv along the Mediterranean coast. For students, Herzliya is an ideal area as it is located in the center of the country and has both train and bus service available to all points throughout Israel. The IDC campus is in a residential neighborhood as are the student apartments – leafy, quiet streets with all the required amenities. Herzliya has malls, restaurants and pubs, concert halls, a downtown outdoor street mall with cafes and shops, parks and recreational facilities including jogging and bicycle paths and, of course, a beautiful, white sand beach.

IDC is surrounded by an urban environment that is characterized by a flourishing high-tech sector which has earned Israel the nickname "Silicon Wadi" and has attracted the interest of the world's leading venture-capital firms. Many of the Israeli software and biotech companies traded on the American stock exchanges are located in the Herzliya area including Hewlett- Packard, Horizon Semiconductors, IBM, Kodak IL, Microsoft, Motorola and Texas Instruments.

## LIVING ARRANGEMENTS

Raphael Recanati International School undergraduate students have the option of residing in IDC housing. These are comfortable apartments located off campus in residential neighborhoods throughout the city of Herzliva that IDC rents from private owners and then sublets exclusively to our students in groups of three to six students per apartment. Each student has his/her own bedroom which is furnished with a single bed (linens and towels are not included), desk, chair and closet. The shared kitchen includes a refrigerator, cooking platter and washing machine. The shared living room has sofas, a coffee table and dining table and chairs. The bathroom is also shared. There are a very limited number of master bedroom suites (bedrooms with connecting private bathrooms) which cost an extra \$50 US per month. The monthly rent is \$625 US (\$675 US for a master bedroom suite).\* The fee covers rent, municipal taxes and maintenance charges. Students are responsible for paying utility bills (water, gas, electricity, telephone, etc.) and arranging their own Internet connections. Students

renting an IDC apartment must sign a rental contract and a Code of Residency agreement before receiving the keys. The rental period ends on July 31. No refunds will be given for early departure.

There are a limited number of apartments available. In order to reserve a room a deposit of \$1,000 US must be paid no later than 10 days after acceptance to the school. The room deposit, which is a separate amount from the tuition deposit, will become a security deposit once the student moves into the apartment. It will be returned approximately six months after the student moves out of the apartment, pending payment of all outstanding bills and provided that no damage was caused. This housing program is designated only for students who arrive from abroad and whose immediate family does not live in Israel. Students please note: The above information is subject to change and notification will be sent out if there are changes.

# HEALTH INSURANCE

All IDC Herzliya students are required to have comprehensive health insurance coverage throughout the period of their studies. Israeli residents, including new immigrants, receive national health insurance for a low monthly fee in accordance with the country's health insurance legislation. International students who are not covered by Israel's national health insurance must purchase a health insurance policy which will cover their health needs while studying at IDC. All students will be charged \$690 US\* per year for comprehensive health insurance. If a student has alternative health insurance he/she must provide the IDC Absorption Coordinator with supporting documentation prior to the start of studies and the charge will be credited to student's tuition. In order to have continuous coverage, the policy will automatically be renewed from one academic year to the next unless the student notifies the school in writing that he/she wishes to cancel.

# VISA & STATUS ASSISTANCE

Students are responsible for clarifying and establishing their status in Israel and can turn to the Raphael Recanati International School staff for advice and assistance. Before commencing studies, all students must clarify their status and eligibility for a student visa (A-2) or Israeli citizenship with the Israeli embassy or consulate in their country of origin. International students who are children of an Israeli parent must settle all matters, such as deferment of military service, with the nearest Israeli embassy or consulate. # **SCHOLARSHIPS**

Various scholarship opportunities are available to students at the Raphael Recanati International School. The scholarships are awarded based on the candidate's background and/or status in Israel.

## Masa Scholarships

The Jewish Agency for Israel and the Israel Prime Minister's Office co-sponsor the Masa project to encourage young Jews who are not Israeli residents to study in Israel. Students up to the age of thirtyone, who have not been to Israel on a long term program before, are eligible for a grant from Masa to go towards tuition at the Raphael Recanati International School. Students will receive an initial grant based on their country of origin and can apply for additional funding of up to \$10,000 US which is awarded based on financial need.

# Raphael Recanati International School Scholarships

The school provides scholarships directly to its students based on financial need. Applicants interested in receiving a scholarship must complete the Application Form on-line, during the registration period, providing all of the information and documentation requested in order to be considered. Scholarship application forms are on-line at <a href="https://www.idc.ac.il/RRISScholarships">www.idc.ac.il/RRISScholarships</a>. Only forms that have been completed in full will be considered. Scholarship applications will be evaluated only after the applicant has been accepted to the school. Please note that scholarship recipients who withdraw during the academic year will be required to return all or part of the funds awarded.

Students who receive a scholarship are expected to perform thirty hours of community service over the course of the academic year in the school's offices or through one of the many organizations that cooperate with RRIS. Scholarship recipients can choose to tutor and mentor children, work with the elderly, create meals for the poor or volunteer with one of the non-profit organizations that operate in the Herzliya area.

## Federal Loans For American Students (FAFSA)

# REQUIRED PREPARATORY COURSES

The Raphael Recanati International School curriculum includes preparatory courses prior to the beginning of the academic year in order to help students obtain the math and English language skills necessary to succeed in their studies.

Business Administration students are required to complete a preparatory course in math. Students for whom English is a second language, or who studied at a high school at which English was not the primary language of instruction, must take an English proficiency examination. Students who earn the required grade on either the TOEFL (Test of English as a Foreign Language), IELTS (International English Language Testing System), PEARSON (Language Test), Cambridge English Assessment (CAE or CPE), or the Israeli Psychometric/Amiram are exempt from the English preparatory course.

# ORIENTATION WEEK

The orientation program provides first-year students with the opportunity to meet one another, get acquainted with the academic and administrative staff, check out the campus facilities and explore the Herzliya area. The orientation program includes various social activities, information sessions regarding administration, the use of the campus facilities and an overnight excursion that is pure fun. This week is a vital part of the IDC Herzliya experience and is an effective way to ease into campus life. Participation is mandatory for all first-year students.

# LEARNING HEBREW

Hebrew is offered as an elective course for credit to RRIS students. Interested students will take a placement test and then placed into appropriate classes based on their test results. Classes are designed to help students feel comfortable using Hebrew. In addition, IDC offers a six week, intensive Summer Hebrew *Ulpan* which allows IDC students to learn Hebrew during the summer vacation. The *Ulpan* is run in conjunction with the Ministry of Education and the Ministry of Absorption and offers five levels of intensive Hebrew instruction. Please note that summer *ulpan* students are responsible for their own accommodations.





# THE LEA & NAFTALI BEN-YEHUDA STUDY SKILLS CENTER

The Center strives to help students who have been diagnosed with learning disabilities and/or attention deficit disorder to succeed academically. Learning disabilities result in a wide range of difficulties in reference to academic skills: reading; writing; processing information; and issues in time and self

management. The Center has three main goals: to provide the student with the most significant strategies; develop the student's independent studying skills; and raise the student's awareness of his own style of studying. The Center offers both workshops and individual sessions.


# **NEVZLIN PROGRAM** OF JEWISH PEOPLEHOOD

The Nevzlin Program of Jewish Peoplehood aims to give its students a broad basis of knowledge in Jewish history and Jewish cultural creation, as well as in the Jews' contribution to world cultures. The program strives to test the limits of Jewish pluralism: its essence; contents; and common characteristics. It includes courses in Bible studies, Jewish history, Jewish philosophy, Hebrew literature, Jewish and Israeli music and Jewish art. Most of the courses, primarily intended for international students, will be taught in English.

The Zell Entrepreneurship Program is a venture creation program for outstanding undergraduate students from all of the faculties at IDC Herzliya. The unique and innovative program, in its twelfth year, is funded generously by renowned entrepreneur Sam Zell of Chicago. It allows students to take an idea and to develop it into a real business venture in the course of an academic year. The venture creation process is complemented by advanced academic courses and an industry expert mentor assigned to each venture. The culmination of the year long program is a study trip to the US. Numerous ventures have launched as a result of the program and a few made significant exits.

# THE DUAL DEGREE IN INTERNATIONAL BUSINESS LAW AND BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION



#### **PROGRAM**

The program, which is taught in English, focuses on global legal principles and is designed to provide the students with an in-depth understanding of international business law. The program's graduates will complete their studies at our school practice-ready, holding the tools to successfully integrate into the global legal world as well as the international business sphere.

Graduates of this four year program will receive an LLB degree in Law with a specialization in International Business Law, and will have the option of obtaining a dual degree in Law and Business Administration (LLB + BA) by extending their studies by one summer semester. Upon completion of their studies, the program's graduates will be able to pursue legal internship and sit the bar exam in Israel as well as sit for the bar examination in foreign jurisdictions subject to the required adaptations to the local regulations in each country.

One of the Dual Degree in International Business Law and Business Administration program's main goals is to create a truly international learning experience. We are constantly expanding the school's international focus and developing new and exciting opportunities for our students to explore the legal discipline on a global level. Radzyner School of Law is one of the founding members of the Law Schools Global League – an alliance between more than twenty law schools across the globe, designed to promote mutual global academic ventures – and maintains strong collaborative relations with leading law schools in the world. Our students also have the opportunity of studying abroad for one semester as part of our extensive student exchange program.

Students will also be able to choose from a wide variety of English taught elective courses from all other programs in the Raphael Recanati International School, including in government and diplomacy, psychology, business, communications and more. ## Eligibility to Take the Bar Examination

#### » Israe

In order to take the bar examination and become a member of the Israel Bar Association, one must hold a degree in law obtained from a recognized Israeli institute of higher education. It is also required to complete a one-year internship.

#### » United States

Eligibility to take the bar in the US varies from state to state. Graduates of a non-US law school are eligible to take the bar in various states subject to varying requirements, such as the obtainment of an LLM from an ABA approved school or the completion of graduate law courses, practice of law in home jurisdiction, determination of educational equivalency, etc.

#### » Canada

In Common Law jurisdictions (the English-speaking provinces and territories in Canada), in order to practice as a lawyer, foreign applicants must obtain admission to the Canadian Law Society of a specific province or territory. To do this, applicants must first receive Certificate of Qualification from the National Committee of Accreditation (NCA) of the Federation of Law Societies of Canada (FLSC). Anyone may apply for an assessment, which is then made on a case-by-case basis.

#### » England

In order to qualify as solicitors, overseas graduates are required to take a one year conversion course (the Common Professional Examination/Post-Graduate Diploma in Law), followed by a Legal Practice Course (LPC). After completing these courses, graduates are eligible to begin their two-year training with an authorized firm of solicitors.

# **BUSINESS AND LAW FACULTY**



#### Dr. Rifat Azam, LLD, The Hebrew University of Jerusalem, 2006

Dr. Azam is an assistant professor at Radzyner School of Law. His teaching and research interests include tax law, international taxation, tax policy, cyberspace law and e-commerce taxation. He was a Michigan Grotius Visiting Scholar at the University of Michigan Law School and a Visiting Researcher at Harvard Law School. Prior to joining IDC, Dr. Azam served as Legal Assistant to Chief Justice Aharon Barak at the Supreme Court of Israel.



Prof. Barak served as a Justice on the Supreme Court of Israel for 28 years, 11 of which as President. He also served as the Attorney General of Israel. He teaches as a Visiting Professor at Yale University School of Law and at the University of Toronto School of Law. He taught at the law schools of the University of Michigan and NYU. Prof. Barak served as chairman of various public commissions, including the Public Commission for the New Law on Government Corporations, for the Codification of Civil Law and others. He has published many books and articles about law and has received various awards such as the Israel Prize for Law and the Zeltner Prize.



#### Prof. Moshe Barniv, PhD, Tel Aviv University, 1983

Prof. Barniv was dean of Radzyner School of Law. He lectures on business law in senior executive programs in major Israeli institutions and corporations. Prof. Barniv was a member of the Board of Directors of the Israeli Stock Exchange and of the association which organized the 50th jubilee events in Israel. He has also been active as a partner in a law firm, an entrepreneur and a businessman. Among his business activities Dr. Barniv established and managed Yeda Computers Ltd. which was a publically traded company.

#### Dr. Lior Barshack, PhD, University of Oxford, 1996

Dr. Barshack is a professor at Radzyner School of Law. His main areas of research are the theory of sovereignty, law and theories of kinship, and law and aesthetics. He was a visiting professor at Birkbeck College, School of Law. London.





# Prof. Yishai Beer, PhD, The Hebrew University of Jerusalem, 1990

Prof. Beer is a professor at Radzyner School of Law and served as dean. Prof. Beer's specialty is taxation and he has taught courses and seminars in taxation and corporate law at The Hebrew University of Jerusalem. He was also a Visiting Scholar at Harvard Law School and at NYU Law School. In addition to his academic career, Prof. Beer is also a Major General (res.) in the Israel Defense Forces. He served as a corps commander and as president of the Israeli Military Court of Appeals (2002-2007).



#### Dr. Eli Bukspan, S.J.D., Harvard Law School, 1996

Dr. Bukspan's research focuses on: the legal aspects of corporate responsibility; contract and corporate law, as well as their interplay with social and ethical disciplines; and consumer protection, labor, environmental and public law. His main fields of teaching are in contract and corporate law. Dr. Bukspan was the founder of The Program for Legal Support and Social Involvement, the first legal clinic established at IDC, which he now chairs. He also served as editor-in-chief of the IDC Law Review. His public roles include serving as chair of the Fund for Class Action Funding.



#### Prof. Moshe Halbertal, PhD, The Hebrew University of Jerusalem, 1989

Prof. Halbertal received his PhD in Jewish thought and philosophy from The Hebrew University of Jerusalem. He is a professor of law at NYU Law School and at Radzyner School of Law, and a professor of Jewish thought and philosophy at The Hebrew University of Jerusalem. He was a Visiting Professor at Harvard Law School, the University of Pennsylvania Law School and was a Fellow at the Society of Fellows at Harvard University. Prof. Halbertal is the recipient of the Bruno Award of the Rothschild Foundation and the Goren Goldstein Award for the best book in Jewish thought.



Dr. Jacob is primarily interested in tort law, computer law and intellectual property law. Other teaching and research interests include law and economics and theories of property rights. Dr. Jacob earned his LLB from Tel Aviv University where he served as a member of the editorial board of the *Tel Aviv University Law Review* and later as an associate editor. He served as a clerk to the former Chief Justice Meir Shamgar. Dr. Jacob received his LLM from the University of Chicago Law School and is a member of the Israel Bar Association.



#### Dr. Daphna Kapeliuk, J.S.D, Tel Aviv University, 2006


Dr. Kapeliuk received an LLM from Katholieke Universiteit Leuven in Belgium and an LLB from The Hebrew University of Jerusalem. Her research focuses mainly on alternative dispute resolution, international business arbitration and private international law. Dr. Kapeliuk's articles on arbitration have been published in some of the field's leading journals.



#### Prof. Alon Klement, S.J.D., Harvard Law School, 2000

Prof. Klement holds an LLM from Harvard Law School and an LLB and BA in Economics from Tel Aviv University. He visited and taught at Columbia University, Boston University and at the University of Bologna. Prof. Klement was a fellow at the Harvard Program on Negotiation and has taught at Harvard College and at the Law School's graduate program. His research focuses on civil procedure, law and economics and law and social norms. He specializes in class actions, on which he has published most of his articles in leading law reviews.





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#### Dr. Ronen Kritenshtein, LLD, The Hebrew University of Jerusalem, 2006

Dr. Kritenshtein serves as Radzyner School of Law's vice dean. He holds several additional academic degrees in economics, business administration, Talmud and history. Dr. Kritenshtein's main fields of expertise are property law, Jewish law and inheritance law. He was a visiting professor at The Yeshiva University Center for Jewish Law and Contemporary Civilization at Benjamin N. Cardozo School of Law. Dr. Kritenshtein is also the academic coordinator of the Israel Bar Association's inheritance law course for lawyers.

#### Prof. Amnon Lehavi, J.S.D., Yale Law School, 2003

Prof. Lehavi is the Atara Kaufman Professor of Real Estate at Radzyner School of Law, and academic director of Gazit-Globe Real Estate Institute at IDC. He has published extensively in leading journals including the Columbia Law Review, Virginia Law Review, Texas Law Review, Law and Social Inquiry, and Yale Journal of International Law and others. Prof. Lehavi has won numerous prizes, including the Tzeltner Award for an outstanding young scholar and the IDC Award for Excellence in Scholarship. He currently serves as the chairperson of the Israeli Association of Private Law.



#### Prof. Amir Licht, S.J.D., Harvard Law School, 1998

Prof. Licht holds an S.J.D. and LLM from Harvard Law School and an LLB and BA from Tel Aviv University. He specializes in corporate law, securities regulation, advanced corporate governance, multinational corporations, law and social norms, and securities regulation in global markets. He has visited and taught at Berkeley, Pompeu-Fabra University and Duke-HKU Asia-America Institute in Transnational Law, HKU. His research is published in leading journals in law, financial economics and management, both in Israel and abroad. He also consults various governmental bodies, such as the Ministry of Justice and the Israel Antitrust Authority.

#### Dr. Eliav Lieblich, J.S.D., Columbia University School of Law, 2012

Dr. Lieblich holds an LLM from Columbia University Law School and an LLB from The Hebrew University of Jerusalem. Dr. Lieblich's fields of expertise include: public international law; the international law on the use of force; international humanitarian law; international human rights law; and international organizations. He was a recipient of the Norman E. Alexander Scholarship at Columbia and was a Neubauer Fellow at Tel Aviv University's Institute for National Security Studies. Dr. Lieblich has given legal counseling to international organizations, governmental bodies and civil society organizations.





#### Dr. Moran Ofir, PhD, The Hebrew University of Jerusalem, 2012

Dr. Ofir received her doctorate from the Center for Rationality of The Hebrew University of Jerusalem where she also completed a law degree and MBA. Dr. Ofir specializes in: corporate law and securities; corporate finance; economic analysis of law; and behavioral law and economics. She was a Visiting Scholar at the Hauser Global Law School Program of New York University.





Dr. Orgad specializes in comparative constitutional law, comparative immigration law, constitutional identity, citizenship theory, and multiculturalism. He holds an LLM from The Hebrew University, an LLM from Columbia Law School and an LLB and BA from IDC Herzliya. Dr. Orgad visited at Harvard, Columbia, NYU, the Roosevelt Academy and Utrecht University. He served on Israel's Advisory Committee on Immigration Policy, Israel's National Security Council and was a Fellow at the Jewish People Policy Institute. Dr. Orgad was the recipient of several prizes and fellowships including the Dan David Scholarship Prize, Fulbright Alumni Prize, Rothschild Fellowship, Jean Monnet Fellowship and others.

#### Prof. Uriel Procaccia, S.J.D., University of Pennsylvania, 1972

Prof. Procaccia serves as head of Radzyner School of Law's LLM program. He is also a Fellow at the Center for the Study of Rationality at The Hebrew University and a Member of the Academic Board at the Institute of Law and Culture (Rechts als Kultur), Bonn, Germany. Prof. Procaccia has visited and lectured at various universities worldwide including: Wharton; University of Southern California; University of Tuebingen, Germany; Columbia University and Cardozo. Prof. Procaccia wrote the draft of the new Israeli Companies Law and was appointed by the Securities Authority as chair of the Advisory Committee on Alternative Trading Systems.



#### Dr. Yuval Procaccia, S.J.D., Harvard Law School, 2009

Dr. Procaccia specializes in economic analysis of law, behavioral law and economics and contract law. He holds an LLM from Harvard Law School as well as an MA in Economics and a joint LLB and BA in Law and Economics from The Hebrew University of Jerusalem. He was a research fellow at the Olin Center of Law, Economics and Business and at the Program on Negotiation at Harvard. Dr. Procaccia won a Fulbright Fellowship, the E. David Fischman Fellowship, and The Hebrew University Rector Prize. After his LLB studies, Dr. Procaccia clerked at the Supreme Court of Israel for Justice Dalia Dorner.



#### Prof. Sharon Rabin-Margalioth, J.S.D., New York University Law School, 1997

Prof. Rabin-Margalioth is the dean of Radzyner School of Law. She holds a J.S.D. and an LLM from NYU and an LLB from The Hebrew University. Prof. Rabin-Margalioth was a Visiting Scholar at NYU and Harvard and a Global Visiting Professor of Law at NYU. Prof. Rabin-Margalioth's research focuses on employment discrimination law, the legal impact of the entrance of women into the workforce, procedural protection of employee rights, and the relationship between legal rules and the transformation of the labor market. Her articles are often cited by the Israeli courts, including the Supreme Court.

#### Dr. Anat Rosenberg, PhD, Tel Aviv University, 2011

Dr. Rosenberg completed her LLB at The Hebrew University of Jerusalem. She was a Visiting Fellow at Columbia University and a Research Fellow at the Sacher Institute for Legislative Research and Comparative Law. Dr. Rosenberg's research interests focus on: liberal thought in late modernity and liberalism critique; cultural representations of modern market society; contract law and perceptions of the contracting individual; the promise of marriage; and the interrelations of law and literature.

#### Prof. Amnon Rubinstein, PhD, London School of Economics, 1960

Prof. Rubinstein is a professor and a member of the senior staff of Radzyner School of Law. He has taught at Tel Aviv University also serving as faculty dean. Prof. Rubenstein won the Israel Prize for Law, served as Education Minister. His specializations are: constitutional law; multiculturalism; education; and human rights. His main research and publications concern Israeli law and the legal foundations, social and historical context of Israeli society.



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#### Prof. Guy Seidman, S.J.D., Northwestern University, 1999

Prof. Seidman graduated Tel Aviv University with an LLB and LLM. He has visited and taught at various institutions in Israel, Europe and the United States including the University of Chicago, Northwestern University, Boston University and the Max Planck Institute at Heidelberg. Prof. Seidman is primarily interested in administrative law and comparative law and the cross between the two. A former officer of the Israeli Judge Advocate General`s Corps., Prof. Seidman's other teaching and research interests include military law as well as medical law. Prof. Seidman has written extensively in his fields of research.

#### Prof. Yoram Shachar, PhD, Oxford University, 1976

Prof. Shachar is a full professor at Radzyner School of Law and served as the school's first dean. He was J.R. Fellow at St. John's College, Oxford, and held visiting positions at the University of Michigan, Boston University and the University of Southern California. Prof. Shachar was also a Resarch Fellow at the Max Planck Institute for Public and International Law in Germany and a Fellow at the Institute of Advanced Studies of The Hebrew University. Prof. Shachar's areas of research are legal systems, legal history and criminal law.





#### Dr. Hillel Sommer, J.S.D., Yale Law School, 1994

Dr. Sommer holds an LLM from Yale Law School and an LLB from Tel Aviv University. He was the recipient of a Fulbright Fellowship for his studies at Yale. At IDC, Dr. Sommer served as the first dean of Student Affairs and as vice dean of the Law School. Dr. Sommer published several law review articles in Israel and abroad. In the past Dr. Sommer (who is admitted to practice law in Israel and in New York) practiced with Haim Zadock & Co., Tel Aviv, and with Cadwalader, Wickersham & Taft, Washington D.C.





#### Dr. Rivka Weill, J.S.D., Yale Law School, 2002

Dr. Rivka is an associate professor at Radzyner School of Law. She received her LLM from Yale Law School and holds BA degrees in both law and accounting. Dr. Weill received IDC's "Best Researcher in Law School" award as well as the IDC's "Best Lecturer in Law School" award. Her areas of expertise are constitutional law and administrative law, with a focus on both theoretical and comparative aspects of the fields. Dr. Weill's articles have been published in leading law journals in the United States, the United Kingdom and Israel.

#### Dr. Ruth Zafran, LLD, The Hebrew University of Jerusalem, 2004

Dr. Zafran has an LLB from Tel Aviv University. She was a visiting scholar at The Center for The Study of Law and Society at UC Berkeley. Dr. Zafran's research focuses on family law, especially the status of children in the family and the legal ramifications of assisted reproductive technology.



#### Dr. Lior Zemer, PhD, Osgoode Hall Law School, Toronto, Canada 2005 Dr. Zemer joined the Radzyner School o

Dr. Zemer joined the Radzyner School of Law in 2006. 

He and his family moved to the United States and influenced the cultural life of Miami by establishing the National Foundation for Advancement in the Arts, the New World Symphony, and purchasing the Miami Heat NBA team. The Arison Foundation in the US was founded in 1991, followed by his foundation in Israel which supports and contributes to education, health, research, and art. The Arison School of Business was established in 1995.

# BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION SPECIALIZATIONS

#### Finance

The major in finance prepares students to succeed in lucrative positions in financial institutions such as banks and insurance companies, and in the financial departments of corporations and consulting firms.

Finance is one of the most dynamic fields in business administration. The increasing globalization of markets and stock exchanges and the ongoing development of sophisticated new financial instruments means that companies need to constantly master the latest financial techniques. Companies and institutions in the capital markets obtain their competitive edge by using the most sophisticated instruments to price assets, raise funds, evaluate potential investments, manage risks and implement mergers and acquisitions.


The major in finance teaches both theoretical principles and practical skills with courses on corporate finance, asset investments and derivatives, financial risk management and investment portfolio management. Students apply all this in a seminar in which they complete a consulting project, either evaluating a company or researching performance in the capital market. In addition to preparing students for successful careers, the major in finance teaches them how to manage capital.

# Marketing

The major in marketing provides students with wideranging, in-depth knowledge of the various components of marketing as well as an understanding of modern marketing. The teachers present theories and the latest research, using them to analyze case studies. Guest lecturers share their experience and wisdom, and students obtain real-world experience by working on team projects with leading companies. In addition to the classic marketing courses, the curriculum includes innovative courses such as electronic commerce management, integrated marketing communications, retail marketing management and public relations, as well as workshops on creativity in marketing and presentations.

# **BUSINESS ADMINSTRATION CURRICULUM**

The undergraduate program leading to a BA in business administration consists of approximately 120 credits and is designed to be completed over a period of three years or six semesters. Students can choose to major in either marketing or finance. Students are expected to take 12 credits of either marketing or finance courses, 10 credits of business administration electives and 4 credits of general electives.

#### General Studies Unit

In addition, all Business Administration program students must take 4 credits from the General Studies Unit during the course of their studies (see separate General Studies Unit file on IDC website).






#### Prof. Evgeny Lyandres, PhD, University of Rochester, 2004


#### Prof. Eitan Muller, PhD, Northwestern University, 1977

# Prof. Yair Tauman, PhD, The Hebrew University of Jerusalem, 1979



#### Prof. Hanna Adoni, PhD, The Hebrew University of Jerusalem, 1977

Prof. Adoni is professor emeritus of the Communication and Journalism Department of The Hebrew University of Jerusalem. She served as a co-editor of Devarim Achadim: The Israel Journal of Communication, Culture and Society. 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

Providing a broad based perspective, the courses offered in the government program explore the impact of political forces, social issues, business interests and economic policies on domestic and global politics, along with factors such as the media, culture and technology. The program looks at issues confronting the world today: the environment; ethnic conflicts; nuclear strategy; terrorism; and gender issues. Additionally, students examine the inner workings of the Middle East in all their complexity, while also viewing the region within the context of globalization. The study of Israel is comprehensive in scope, including exposure to all facets of the Israeli polity – from issues of democracy to foreign policy to questions of national security. The studies are built on the concept of combining theory with practice, exposing students to real-life situations through case studies, simulations, internships, and face-to-face meetings with key figures.

During the final year of the program, students select one or two areas for in-depth study, earning a Certificate of Specialization in the area(s) of their choice. The specializations offered in the program include: International Affairs; Conflict Resolution; The Middle East; Counter-Terrorism; and Business Administration.

The Lauder School of Government attracts excellent students from around the world providing a unique opportunity for networking and as well as a diversity of ideas and views. Many of our students have gone on to leading American and European universities for their graduate studies. Others have added one year to their studies at IDC in order to complete a master's degree in government at the Lauder School. Four different tracks are offered in our graduate program: Diplomacy and Conflict Studies; Counter-Terrorism and Homeland Security; (taught in English); Public Administration and Policy; and Political Marketing (taught in Hebrew). Alumni have also gone on to fascinating careers in government, NGOs and international institutions worldwide.

#### Dr. Dmitry (Dima) Adamsky, PhD, Haifa University, 2008

Dr. Dmitry (Dima) Adamsky has been a pre- and post-doctoral fellow at Harvard University, and a visiting fellow at the Institute of War and Peace Studies, Columbia University. His research interests include international security, cultural approach to IR, modern military thought, and nuclear strategy. He has published on these topics in leading academic journals and edited volumes. His first book Operation Kavkaz (Hebrew) earned the prize for the best academic work on Israeli security in 2006. His second book The Culture of Military Innovation (Stanford UP 2010) earned the same prize in 2012. In addition to his academic career, in his positions in the Israeli Ministry of Defense and the IDF, Dr. Adamsky has carried out intelligence analysis and strategic policy planning.



#### Dr. Yariv Ben Eliezer, PhD, New York University, 1977

Dr. Ben Eliezer is the director of Media Studies at the Lauder School and of the Political and Marketing Communications Program at the Sammy Ofer School of Communications at IDC. He has served as the dean of the Media School at the College of Management in Tel Aviv. Dr. Ben Eliezer has held senior positions in political campaigns including the Tzomet Party's 1992 Knesset campaign, Israeli President Shimon Peres' 1996 campaign for the premiership, and Herzliya Mayor Yael German's 1998 and 2003 election campaigns. He has written six books and many articles.



#### Dr. Isabel Berman, PhD, Columbia University, 1985

Dr. Berman taught English as a foreign language at The Hebrew University of Jerusalem. She developed and taught an English language course for Foreign Ministry cadets and one for Knesset members. She developed the English section of the Israeli University Psychometric Examination and worked at the National Institute of Testing as a consultant. At the Open University of Israel, Dr. Berman co-directed the development of seven English language reading comprehension courses. She has been with IDC since its inception and developed the Communications Skills in English courses for students of law, government and communications. At IDC she also teaches Political Satire, an English elective course.



#### Dr. Amnon Cavari, PhD, University of Wisconsin-Madison, 2011

Dr. Cavari specializes in American politics with specific research interests in the presidency, public opinion and political parties, and the interrelationship between them. He also studies American elite and public support for Israel. Dr. Cavari earned his PhD in political science from the University of Wisconsin-Madison and has an LLB and MA from the Hebrew University of Jerusalem.


#### Prof. Alex Mintz, PhD, Northwestern University, 1981

Dr. Moghadam is senior lecturer at the Lauder School and senior researcher at the International Institute for Counterterrorism (ICT). Previously, he taught at the United States Military Academy at West Point, where he also served as Director of Terrorism Studies. Dr. Moghadam also held pre-doctoral and post-doctoral fellowships at Harvard University. His research interests include terrorism, suicide terrorism, Al Qaeda and global jihad, ethnic and civil conflict, and the role of religion in international affairs. Dr. Moghadam has published four books on terrorism and political violence, including *The Globalization of Martyrdom: Al Qaeda, Salafi Jihad, and the Diffusion of Suicide Attacks*.



#### Prof. David Nachmias, PhD, University of Oregon, 1971

Prof. Nachmias heads the Reinventing Israeli Government Project at IDC and specializes in public policy, public administration and Israeli politics. He has published numerous books, articles in professional journals and policy papers. Prof. Nachmias has received several international awards, including being named a Fulbright Senior Scholar and receiving the Donald Campbell Award for methodological innovations in policy studies.



#### Dr. Alisa Rubin Peled, PhD, Harvard University, 1994

Dr. Peled is the academic director of the Argov Fellows Program in Leadership and Diplomacy and a senior lecturer at the Lauder School. She is also an external faculty affiliate at Harvard University's Kennedy School of Government's Public Diplomacy Collaborative. Her teaching and research focus on international political economy (with a focus on the Middle East), business-government relations and international higher education. Her first book, *Debating Islam in the Jewish State*, examines Israeli policy towards the state's Muslim minority. Her book *The American Ivory Tower Overseas: Localization and the Rise of US Higher Education in the Arab World* is forthcoming from Harvard University Press.



#### Dr. Jennifer Shkabatur, PhD, Harvard Law School, 2012

Dr. Shkabatur's research explores innovative forms of governance and political action enabled by the new information technologies, and studies open government policies, online political campaigns and the role of new technologies in developing countries. She also serves as a consultant at the World Bank on information technologies, governance, and innovation matters. Dr. Shkabatur holds doctorate and master's degrees from Harvard Law School, and masters in political science and bachelor in law from Tel Aviv University.



# MASTER'S DEGREE PROGRAM ORGANIZATIONAL BEHAVIOR AND DEVELOPMENT (OBD)

The master's degree in Organizational Behavior and Development (OBD) is a relatively new program offered by the Arison School of Business in collaboration with the School of Psychology. The program is taught by some of the field's leading lecturers, whose rich academic and research experience in universities throughout Israel and the world has won international renown. Headed by Professor Dan Zakay, former chairperson of the Israel Psychologists Association and former head of the Israeli Association for Organizational Development, the program is characterized by hands-on field work, with students gaining practical experience as interns in consulting companies and organizations.

## **PSYCHOLOGY FACULTY**



#### Prof. Alan Apter, MD, University of Witwatersrand, 1968

Prof. Apter is director of the Feinberg Child Study Center at the Schneider Children's Medical Center of Israel. His major fields of expertise include child and adolescent depression and suicide, and Tourette syndrome. He is a graduate of the Witwatersrand University of Medicine, George Washington University in Child Psychiatry and Albert Einstein College of Medicine in Biological Psychiatry.



#### Dr. Shahar Ayal, PhD, Tel Aviv University, 2006

Dr. Ayal earned his PhD in social psychology from Tel Aviv University. He was a postdoctoral fellow at the Technion – Israel Institute of Technology and then at the Fuqua School of Business at Duke University. Dr. Ayal's main research interests are heuristics and biases, unethical behavior and the effect of inter-group relations on decision making.



#### Dr. Boaz M. Ben-David, PhD, Tel Aviv University, 2007

Dr. Ben-David is a cognitive psychologist and the head of the Communication Aging and Neuropsychology lab (CANlab) at IDC. He also holds academic positions at the Toronto Rehabilitation Institute and the University of Toronto. His current focus is on communication, cognitive and sensory integration in aging. Dr. Ben-David has won several grants and awards, notably: the Marie Curie Career Integration Award; a grant from Bronfman Philanthropies; a collaborative grant from the Alzheimer's Society of Canada; and a post-doctoral award from the Ontario Neurotrauma Foundation. He is currently the grant manager on a multi-national grant on active and healthy aging from the European Commission.



#### Dr. Tal Ben-Shahar, PhD, Harvard University, 2004

Dr. Ben-Shahar is a psychologist and lecturer who taught "Positive Psychology," the most popular course at Harvard University.
Dr. Ben-Shahar consults and lectures around the world to executives in multi-national corporations, the general public and at-risk populations on happiness, self-esteem, performance, perfectionism, resilience, goal setting, mindfulness and leadership. He is the author of *Happier: Learn the Secrets to Daily Joy and Lasting Fulfillment*.



#### Prof. Gurit Birnbaum, PhD, Bar-Ilan University, 1998

Prof. Birnbaum's research focuses on the convoluted role sexuality plays in the broader context of close relationships. She frequently contributes to international academic journals. Prof. Birnbaum was a lecturer at Bar-llan University and the head of its Experimental Psychology Program as well as a visiting professor at the University of Minnesota.





#### Anat Brunstein Klomek, PhD, Bar-Ilan University, 2004

Dr. Klomek is a clinical psychologist. She completed a postdoctoral research fellowship in the Division of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry at Columbia University where she is currently an adjunct associate research scientist. Dr. Klomek's research interests include bullying behaviors, learning disorders, depression, suicidality and eating disorders among adolescents. She is specifically interested in interventions and psychotherapy for adolescents and their parents. Dr. Klomek is the assistant editor of Archives of Suicide Research.



#### Dr. Guy Doron, PhD, University of Melbourne, 2007



Dr. Doron has been actively researching obsessive-compulsive phenomena since the year 2000. He received several prestigious research grants including the Marie Curie Reintegration Grant and the Israel Science Foundation Grant. Dr. Doron is on the Board of Directors of the Midgam Project (Midgam.com) and a founding member of Tipultec – an Israeli website designed to assist therapists in their clinical work (therapy-assessment.com).

#### Dr. Tsachi Ein-Dor, PhD, Bar-Ilan University, 2009

Dr. Ein-Dor is a senior lecturer at IDC, Herzliya. In his research he tries to offer a new perspective on the strengths of individuals who have long been viewed as deficient and poorly adapted, such as anxious people or people with asocial tendencies. His work has been published in leading psychological journals such as *Journal of Personality and Social Psychology* and *Journal of Personality*.



# Dr. Sarit Guttmann-Steinmetz, PhD, State University of New York, Stony Brook, 2005



Dr. Guttmann-Steinmetz continued in the Department of Psychiatry at Stony Brook as a Post Doc. Her clinical experiences include work with adult psychiatric patients and with children and adolescents who suffer from severe behavioral problems. Aggression is also the focus of her research which investigates the cumulative effects of family relations, parent-child attachment, and exposure to political violence, on the development of behavior problems in children.

#### Dr. Eran Halperin, PhD, University of Haifa, 2007

Dr. Halperin is a senior lecturer at the School of Psychology at IDC. He completed postdoctoral training, through a Fulbright Scholarship, at Stanford University. He serves as an associate editor of the *International Journal of Political Psychology*. Dr. Halperin received the Erikson Award for early career achievements in the field. His main line of research focuses on the role of emotions and emotion regulation in determining public opinion towards peace and equality, on the one hand, and war and discrimination, on the other. In recent years, he has published articles in journals such as: *JPSP*, *JESP*, *Psychological Science*; *JCR*; *BJPS*; *Political Psychology*; and *JPR*.



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#### Prof. Gilad Hirschberger, PhD, Bar-Ilan University, 2002

Prof. Hirschberger is an experimental social psychologist who studies how existential concerns influence our relations with the social world. His research focuses on issues ranging from close relationships to political psychology using a wide range of methods to examine these questions, such as behavioral and physiological measurements. Prof. Hirschberger's research has been funded by an Alon Fellowship and by grants from the Israel Foundation Trustees and the Israel Science Foundation.



# Dr. Yaniv Kanat-Maymon, PhD, Ben Gurion University of the Negev, 2009

Dr. Kanat-Maymon is an organizational psychologist. His research concerns issues regarding contextual factors which may support or undermine experiencing autonomy and sense of volition in major life arenas such as educational and work organizations, as well as in romantic and parent-child relationships. Dr. Kanat-Maymon's research has been funded by the Israel Science Foundation and the U.S.-Israel Binational Science Foundation.



#### Dr. Nava Levit-Binnun, PhD, Weizmann Institute of Science, 2007

Dr. Levit-Binnun is presently the co-director of the Applied Neuroscience Unit at the New School of Psychology, IDC and teaches the biological basis of behavior. Her research focuses on both normal and abnormal development, mindfulness and understanding the regulatory and developmental role of human interactions.



#### Dr. Daniel A. Levy, PhD, The Hebrew University of Jerusalem, 2003

Dr. Levy studies the cognitive neuroscience of human memory and attention, and develops applications to optimize teaching based on brain research. He is also concerned with the interface of philosophy, neuroscience and psychology, especially regarding free will and ethics. He has been a research fellow at the Weizmann Institute of Science, Bar-Ilan University, and UC San Diego.



#### Prof. Mario Mikulincer, PhD, Bar-Ilan University, 1985

Prof. Mikulincer is a prolific author whose works include more than 240 scientific articles and three books. He was chairperson of Barllan University's Psychology Department. Prof. Mikulincer received the 2004 E.M.E.T. Prize in Social Science and the 2006 Berscheid-Hatfield Award from the International Association for Relationship Research.



#### Dr. Ora Nakash, PhD, Boston University, 2003

Dr. Nakash is a clinical psychologist. She served as a research associate at the Center for Multicultural Mental Health Research at the Cambridge Health Alliance/Harvard Medical School. Her research focuses on the effects of social and cultural factors on mental health with specific interest in the field of mental health disparities with the goal of improving the access, equity and quality of these services for disadvantaged and minority populations.



# Dr. Son Preminger, PhD, Weizmann Institute of Science, 2007

Dr. Preminger researches volitional and motivated behavior, the underlying brain mechanisms and their plasticity. More broadly, she is interested in the effect of experience on neurocognitive functions, and in cognitive rehabilitation. She has been developing methods for cognitive rehabilitation using computer games and theater improvisation. Dr. Preminger completed post-doctorate studies in neuroscience at the Weizmann Institute of Science.



#### Dr. Tamar Saguy, PhD, University of Connecticut, 2008

Dr. Saguy is an assistant professor of psychology at IDC. She was a post-doctoral associate at Yale University. Her research centers on the dynamics of intergroup relations, social identity, and power between groups. Her work has been published in leading psychological journals such as *Psychological Science* and in several book chapters.



#### Dr. Anat Shoshani, PhD, Tel Aviv University, 2007

Dr. Shoshani is an assistant professor at the School of Psychology. She received her PhD in clinical psychology and her experience includes working in hospitals, public clinical centers and as a private practitioner. Dr. Shoshani's research interests lie primarily within the fields of political violence and positive psychology, with a particular emphasis on studying the effects of political violence and terrorism on children. She serves as the academic director of the MAYTIV Center, which was established at IDC Herzliya in 2010, and focuses on research and practice in positive psychology.



#### Dr. Rami Tolmacz, PhD, The Hebrew University of Jerusalem, 2000

Dr. Tolmacz is a clinical psychologist; he was the head of the clinical psychology track at Bar-Ilan University. His research focuses on different forms of concern, sense of entitlement in romantic relationships and youth gambling. His clinical experiences include work with adults and with adolescent psychiatric patients.




#### Prof. Dan Zakay, PhD, Tel Aviv University, 1978







# **ADMISSION TO RRIS**

# **English Proficiency**

The academic program of the Raphael Recanati International School is taught entirely in English. Graduates of high schools in which English was not the primary language of instruction are required to pass one of the following exams: TOEFL (Test of English as a Foreign Language), IELTS (International English Language Testing System), PEARSON (Language Test), Cambridge English Assessment (CAE or CPE), or the Israeli Psychometric/Amiram.

# Application Form and Fees

Applications should be made online at www.rris.idc.ac.il/onlineBAreg

The fee is \$90 US and non-refundable. An essay of 250-500 words, in which the candidate addresses why they would like to study in Israel, at the IDC, in English and in a particular academic program, is to be attached to the online registration together with a curriculum vitae (resume).

#### Deadline

For an application to be considered valid, all forms and other required information must be submitted to the Raphael Recanati International School at IDC Herzliya by July 31, 2014.

## **Transfer Students**

In order to receive credits or exemptions for courses taken at another academic institution, students must submit a detailed syllabus in English for each course for which they are requesting credit and/or an exemption. Please note that IDC Herzliya is not obligated to grant credit for courses taken at other academic institutions. To receive a degree from IDC Herzliya, students must earn at least 60% of the credits at IDC Herzliya and must be enrolled at IDC Herzliya for a minimum of two years.

#### **APPLYING**

Admission decisions are based on a combination of academic and personal criteria: high school grades; standardized test scores (if applicable); letters of recommendation; a curriculum vitae (resume); and a personal essay.

# High School Grades

Applicants must submit official copies of their high school transcript and diploma. Applicants in their final year of high school may submit a partial transcript. Acceptance of such applicants is contingent upon receiving a final transcript showing that they graduated and that the final grades are similar to those earned in previous semesters. Applicants who have completed one year of university or two years of community college studies must submit only their high school diploma and university or community college transcript.

## Recommendations

Applicants must submit two recommendations from people who can evaluate their academic abilities such as teachers, educators, counselors, employers or supervisors.

#### Standardized Tests

Applicants who graduated from a high school in the US must take a standardized test such as the SAT or ACT. However, if they have completed at least one year of university-level studies or two years of community college, they are exempt from this requirement. Students who graduated from a high school in countries outside Israel or the US are not required to take a standardized test.

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# **TUITION AND EXPENSES\***

TUITION \$10,950 US per year

HEALTH INSURANCE \$690 US per year

IDC SPONSORED HOUSING (optional) \$625 US per month

Includes maintenance and municipal taxes, but does not include utilities, internet, etc. For the first year the rental payment begins from the day of checking into the apartment until July 31 of the following year. Every additional year the contract is for 12 months. Please note, students that have master bedrooms must pay an additional \$50/month.

\* All rates are subject to change due to fluctuations in market prices and currency exchange rates.

#### **ADDITIONAL EXPENSES**

Students are responsible for their airfare to and from Israel.

Students should expect to spend about \$600-\$800 US each month for food, travel and other basic expenses. Please note that tuition does not include the cost of the textbooks.

A symbolic fee is charged at some RRIS social and cultural events.

There is an additional materials fee of \$250 US for students in the School of Communications.

#### TUITION PAYMENT ARRANGEMENTS

A \$1,000 US tuition deposit must be sent to the registrar at the Raphael Recanati International School within one month of being accepted to study at IDC Herzliya in order to reserve a place in the class. This deposit is the first tuition payment. An electronic acceptance booklet containing details on how to pay the remainder of the tuition will be sent later. This deposit will be fully refunded to those who decide not to enroll, if they inform the Raphael Recanati International School of their decision in writing by July 11, 2014.
